Project title	Improving Prostate Cancer Services at Mount Vernon Cancer Centre (IPCS Project) – Joint Working
Project partners	Mount Vernon Cancer Centre (MVCC) Bayer Plc
Project summary	The aim of the project is to increase capacity and provide rapid access to prostate cancer services through the introduction of two additional out-patient clinics, one at Mount Vernon Cancer Centre and the second one at West Hertfordshire Teaching Hospitals NHS Trust (WHHT) – St Albans site. The current consultant out-patients' clinics are oversubscribed meaning that consultant clinic slots are not long enough to conduct patient consultations as they would like to. The additional clinics will enable the Oncology Pharmacy Non-Medical Prescriber to manage the less complex non-metastatic patients and the consultant can dedicate their time to the more complex metastatic prostate cancer patients. This would ensure that all patients have the required amount of time with the appropriate healthcare professional.

 other Collaborative Working Projects.
- Increasing capacity and efficiency aims to ensure treatment is in line with NICE guidelines. (Bayer has a NICE approved treatment in this therapy area).
- Opportunity to share outputs, best practice and learning from the collaboration within the oncology community to support service improvement in other locations.
- Aims to increase quality of care and patient satisfaction which aims to help patients increase compliance and adherence to treatment.
